## **Teaching Portfolio**

I have over the years been involved in the design, development and teaching of numerous courses at undergraduate, graduate, and PhD levels, often with very positive student evaluations. In conjunction with the advance of my career, the bulk of my teaching gradually shifted from the undergraduate to MSc and PhD courses. Over the last 10 years or so, I have predominantly taught at MSc and PhD levels. I have also been involved (albeit to a lesser degree) to the teaching of executive programmes. My teaching has been characterised by an emphasis on student course engagement as the principal vehicle of learning. This has been supported by the careful selection of materials, the preparation of real-life cases and a range of student assignments and learning activities distributed throughout a course to ensure continuous student involvement and participation.

For reasons of convenience, I here focus on my recent teaching experience at Luiss and at the Department of Management at the LSE. I thus, leave out numerous other courses I have taught at the University of Uppsala, Stockholm University and the Athens University of Economic and Business, and also other universities which I have been visiting over the years. The overwhelming majority of these courses have been in the areas of organization behaviour and organization theory at undergraduate, graduate and PhD levels and a few on the theory of science and methodology (mostly at the PhD level).

### **Undergraduate and graduate courses**

I currently teach a course on **Digital economy and innovation** for a class of ca 100 students and another MSc course on **Digital Ecosystems** for a class of about 60 students at the Department of Management, Luiss University.

Over the years, I have had a key role in developing and shaping together with a few other colleagues the major current MSc programme of the Information Systems and Innovation Group, entitled “Management of Information Systems and Digital Innovation” (MISDI) which is a 12-months premium fee with a ca 80-100 student intake annually.

I have been course leader and teacher for the MSc course **MG486 Social Computing, Data and information Services** as part of the MISDI MSc Programme at the Department of Management at the LSE for over ten years and up to 2021.

I have also taught and been the responsible teacher for five years (2011-2016) for the MSc course **MG462 Qualitative Methods in Management**, compulsory course in the two-year, pre-experience MSc programme in Management (MiM) at the Department of Management at the LSE with an annual intake of approximately 100 students. .

I have also developed and taught **IS3183 Management and Social Media** is a Lever 3 course offered in the Management and Digital Innovation Programme (MDI) that is a BSc component of the Economics, Management, Finance and the Social Sciences (EMFSS) suite of programmes of the University of London international programme, in which LSE is a member. .

Since I joined LSE in 2001, I have in principle supervised the MSc dissertations of 10-20 students annually, depending on the subject and the availability of other colleagues.

### **PhD Courses**

I have designed and been course leader and teacher of the key MPhil/PhD course **MG502 Foundations of Social Research Paradigms and Traditions**. The course has been designed to train doctoral students in the epistemological and methodological skills required to undertake PhD research in management, organization theory and digital innovation. The course has historically made an important contribution to shaping the numerous students that have been admitted to our PhD programme as well as students from other Groups across the department of management who, due to the unique character and popularity of the course, have attended it over the years. I have, save the year 2009 I which I was in sabbatical leave, uninterruptedly delivered this course to a cohort of 6-12 students (annual intake of PhD students) since its inception, the year 2003.

### **PhD experience and examination**

Since 2003, given my role as PhD programme director, I have been extensively involved in the development of the PhD programme of the Information Systems and innovation Group at the Department of Management at the LSE. I have had the primary responsibility for shaping the programme, which involves 6 examined courses for the first year. In this context, I have had the major responsibility for what in UK is called transfer or upgrade. This involves the defence of the PhD student thesis proposal scheduled for the second year of the programme (18 months maximum). This is an examination that involves both the written PhD thesis proposal 15,000 words and an oral public presentation by the PhD candidate and interrogation by a panel of experts. The successful completion of the test gives the student the ‘pass’ (hence the terms upgrade or transfer) from what, in UK, is called MPhil to the PhD programme.

I have also for several years been running the PhD weekly seminars that entail PhD student presentations of their PhD research as well as external presentations of select and often distinguished speakers.

I have over the years successfully supervised 16 PhD students (2 in Sweden, 1 in Greece and 13 in UK) and have been involved in the examination of around 20 PhD candidates in in UK, Sweden and Norway. As part of my responsibilities as PhD programme director I have advised numerous PhD students.
