INSTRUCTIONAL GOALS	<p>The course is aimed at the study of the law that regulates the organization and activities of public administration, focusing on in its components: the administrative functions, their ways of conduct and the tools through which they are carried out. The course aims to provide students with a basic understanding of the legislative discipline, the case law and its implementation and evolution.</p>
INTENDED LEARNING OUTCOMES	<p><b>Knowledge and understanding:</b> Students will acquire full knowledge of the general principles and disciplines of administrative law, also in the light of the supranational normative framework.</p> <p><b>Applying knowledge and understanding:</b> Students will be able to identify the legal principles and rules of administrative law to be applied to concrete cases, considering different regulatory contexts, including in light of supranational law, and solve legal issues.</p> <p><b>Making judgements:</b> Students will acquire the ability to independently and critically evaluate the fundamental principles and institutes of administrative law, identifying solutions to practical cases.</p> <p><b>Communication skills:</b> Students will be able to master, with adequate terminological precision, the technical-legal vocabulary proper to administrative law, as well as to adapt the vocabulary to different administrative contexts.</p> <p><b>Learning skills:</b> The knowledge acquired during the course will enable students to independently understand and interpret legislative, doctrinal and judicial developments in administrative law.</p>
Pre-requisites	Basic knowledge of public law.
