## 1. What is ECTS?

The European Community promotes inter-university co-operation as a means for improving the quality of education to the benefit of students and higher education institutions alike. Student mobility constitutes a primary feature of that co-operation. The Erasmus + programme clearly demonstrates that a study period abroad can constitute a particularly precious experience, not only being the best way to discover countries, ideas, languages and cultures different from one's own but also because it is gaining a growing importance in the evolution of university and professional careers.

The **European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System (ECTS)** is a tool of the European Higher Education Area (EHEA) for making studies and courses more transparent and thus helping to enhance the quality of higher education.

ECTS was instituted in 1989, within the Erasmus programme, as a way of transferring credits that students earned during their studies abroad into credits that counted towards their degree, on their return to studying in their home institution. In the following years, it came to be used not only for transferring credits, on the basis of workload and achieved learning outcomes, but also for accumulating them in institutions' degree programmes. ECTS helps in the design, description and delivery of programmes, makes it possible to integrate different types of learning in a lifelong learning perspective, and facilitates the mobility of students by easing the process of recognising qualifications and periods of study. ECTS can be applied to all programmes, whatever the mode of delivery (classroom-based, work-based, distance learning) or the status of students (full-time, part-time), and to all kinds of learning contexts (formal, non-formal and informal).

### 1.1 Principal Features of ECTS

ECTS is a learner-centred system for credit accumulation and transfer, based on the principle of **transparency of the learning**, teaching and assessment processes. Its objective is to facilitate the planning, delivery and evaluation of study programmes and student mobility by recognising learning achievements and qualifications and periods of learning.

**ECTS credits** express the volume of learning based on the defined learning outcomes and their associated workload. 60 ECTS credits are allocated to the learning outcomes and associated workload of a full-time academic year or its equivalent, which normally comprises a number of educational components to which credits (on the basis of the learning outcomes and workload) are allocated. ECTS credits are generally expressed in whole numbers.

**Learning outcomes** are statements of what the individual knows, understands and is able to do on completion of a learning process. The achievement of learning outcomes has to be assessed through procedures based on clear and transparent criteria. Learning outcomes are attributed to individual educational components and to programmes at a whole. They are also used in European and national qualifications frameworks to describe the level of the individual qualification.

**Workload** is an estimation of the time the individual typically needs to complete all learning activities such as lectures, seminars, projects, practical work, work placements and individual study required to achieve the defined learning outcomes in formal learning environments. The correspondence of the full-time workload of an academic year to 60 credits is often formalised by national legal provisions. In most cases, workload ranges from 1,500 to 1,800 hours for an academic year, which means that one credit corresponds to 25 to 30 hours of work. It should be recognised that this represents the typical workload and that for individual students the actual time to achieve the learning outcomes will vary.

**Allocation** of credits in ECTS is the process of assigning a number of credits to qualifications, degree programmes or single educational components. Credits are allocated to entire qualifications or programmes according to national legislation or practice, where appropriate, and with reference to national and/or European qualifications frameworks. They are allocated to educational components, such as course units, dissertations, work-based learning and work placements.

**Awarding credits** in ECTS is the act of formally granting students and other learners the credits that are assigned to the qualification and/or its components if they achieve the defined learning outcomes. National authorities should indicate which institutions have the right to award ECTS credits. Credits are awarded to individual students after they have completed the required learning activities and achieved the defined learning outcomes, as evidenced by appropriate assessment.

**Accumulation of credits** in ECTS is the process of collecting credits awarded for achieving the learning outcomes of educational components in formal contexts and for other learning activities carried out in informal and non-formal contexts. A student can accumulate credits in order to:

- obtain qualifications, as required by the degree-awarding institution;
- document personal achievements for lifelong learning purposes.

**Transfer of credits** is the process of having credits awarded in one context (programme, institution) recognised in another formal context for the purpose of obtaining a qualification. Credits awarded to students in one programme may be transferred from an institution to be accumulated in another programme offered by the same or another institution. Credit transfer is the key to successful study mobility. Institutions, faculties, departments may make agreements which guarantee automatic recognition and transfer of credits.

**ECTS documentation:** The use of ECTS credits is facilitated and quality enhanced by the supporting documents (Course Catalogue, Learning Agreement, Transcript of Records, and Work Placement Certificate). ECTS also contributes to transparency in other documents such as the Diploma Supplement.

ECTS goes on **voluntary** use and **reciprocal trust** at academic level among the participating institutions. Every institution chooses its own partners.

## 1.2 Transparency

ECTS guarantees **transparency** through the following instruments:

- The **ECTS Course Catalogue** should provide reliable, up-to-date and quality assured information on degree programmes, as well as on single educational components. It should provide an accurate description of the degree programme, including all details: structure, components, learning outcomes, workload, learning/teaching approaches, assessment methods, assessment criteria, and progression rules.
- The **ECTS learning agreement**, which describes the study plan the student has to follow and indicates the ECTS credits that shall grant upon satisfactory completion thereof. The agreement binds the student to attend the host university's programme as the main part of their higher education, the institution of origin to guarantee the student full academic recognition of the credits obtained abroad and, the host institution to provide the agreed course units to the extent allowed by the academic calendar.
- The **ECTS transcript of records**, which presents the student's academic results in a clear, complete and comprehensible manner for each part and which must be easily transferable from one institution to another.

## 1.3 Academic Recognition

Successful learning mobility requires **academic recognition** and **transfer of credits**. Recognition of credits is the process through which an institution certifies that learning outcomes achieved and assessed in another institution satisfy the requirements of one of the programmes they offer. Given the diversity of programmes and HEIs, it is unlikely that the credits and learning outcomes of a single educational component in two different programmes will be identical. An open and flexible approach to the recognition of credits obtained in another context, including learning mobility, is therefore recommended, based on compatibility of learning outcomes rather than equivalence of course contents. In practice, recognition means that the number of credits gained for compatible learning outcomes achieved in another context will replace the number of credits that are allocated for compatible learning outcomes at the awarding institution. Institutions should make their recognition policies known and easily accessible.

When institutions decide to **transfer their mobility students' grades**, the academic responsible for credit transfer should compare the grade distribution table from their reference group with the one developed by the other institution for the parallel reference group. The position of each grade within the two tables can be compared and, on the basis of this comparison, individual grades are converted. Typically, the percentage ranges of the grades overlap. The objective of the exercise is transparency. Therefore, the receiving institution should decide in advance whether they will take the minimum, average or maximum comparable grade of overlapping ranges.

## 2. Education in Italy

Until 1989 (Law 168/1989) the entire Italian educational system was under the Ministry of Education. At that time the Ministry of Universities and Scientific Research was created to take over the responsibilities of university education and scientific and technological research. The two entities are currently encompassed under the organisational designation **Ministero dell'Istruzione, dell'Università e della Ricerca - MUR** (Ministry of Education, University and Research). ### 2.1 Primary and Secondary Education

#### 2.1.1 Cycles

Following the 2003 Reform of primary and secondary education, the Italian school system has been reorganised as follows:

- **First cycle**
  - Primary education: 5 years of schooling beginning at age 6
  - Secondary education (first degree): 3 years of schooling beginning at age 11.
- **Second cycle**
  - Secondary education (second degree): 5 years of schooling beginning at age 14.

The higher secondary schools are of various types: classical, scientific, linguistic, artistic, technical and vocational studies as well as teacher training. At the end of the 5-year course, students take the examination to obtain the **Diploma di Maturità** in the specialised area they have chosen. This diploma grants admission to an Italian university.

#### 2.1.2 Grading System

Until 1968, **secondary school** grading was on a scale of 0-10, 6 being the minimum passing grade. From 1969 to 1999, final marks were on a scale of 0-60, 36 being the minimum passing grade. Since 2000 a different system has been implemented: final marks are on a scale of 0-100 and the minimum passing grade is 60.

## 2.2 University Education

### 2.2.1 Admission

Admission to Italian universities grants only to holders of a **Diploma di Maturità** from an Italian secondary school. Foreign students, or Italian students from secondary schools abroad, are admitted on the strength of equivalent qualifications. There are no limitations on admission except in Medical School (medicine, dentistry, veterinary), in private independent universities (like Luiss Guido Carli or Bocconi in Milan), and in newly established universities/degree courses.

### 2.2.2 Grading System

In the university grading system, individual courses grade on a scale of 18-30. The maximum final grade is **110**, after the dissertation of a thesis on a free topic. For very brilliant students the degree may be awarded cum laude.

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### 2.2.3 Academic Qualifications and Degrees

#### University Diploma

This is a first-level university qualification for courses lasting 3 years. For admission to these courses, students must have a **Diploma di Maturità**.

#### Laurea (Degree)

The system of university study in Italy has undergone an overall reform in terms of structure and teaching system. Up to 2001, to obtain a **Laurea**, the basic university degree, used to take 4 to 6 years, depending on the field of study. From the academic year 2001/2002, universities have adopted three study cycles. The **first cycle**, three years in length, is characterised by a professional training type content and concludes with the award of a first-level degree (Laurea Triennale – **Bachelor’s Degree**); the **second cycle**, lasting two years, concludes with the award of a second-level Master’s degree (**Laurea Magistralis – Master’s Degree**); while the **third cycle**, lasting from one to three years, leads to the award of either a doctorate or a specialised postgraduate degree.

Teaching activity is organized in departments, schools or areas, which offer one or more degree courses in specific academic areas. Course requirements are established by law and the **laurea** is obtained after the student has passed a set number of exams, gained the required credits, and

successfully discussed a written research paper. Admission to the **Laurea** programme is regulated by the general rules for university admission. Courses for master's degrees may also be offered parallel to each study cycle. All study programmes must be based on the European system for the transfer of academic credits (ECTS) as provided for in recent agreements reached at EU level.

Along with the three-cycle program system established by the Italian Ministerial Decrees, a limited number of "old" second cycle programs (dental medicine, human medicine, pharmacy, veterinary medicine, architecture, law) coexist with the new university system. These programs, called **One-Cycle Programs**, aim at providing students with advanced education and training for highly qualified professions in specific areas. The general access requirement is upper secondary school degree or a comparable foreign qualification. Admission to individual degree programs may be subject to specific course requirements.

One-Cycle Programs last five years and require 300 credits (European Credit Transfer System) for completion (only human medicine requires six years and 360 credits). The degree awarded is a Master's Degree which grants access to competitions for the civil service, to regulated and non-regulated professions, doctoral programs and all the other postgraduate study degree programs.

### **Research Doctorate**

The aim of the doctoral studies programmes is to offer post-graduate opportunity for research. Programmes include individual research under the guidance of professors and special seminars. The minimum period of study is three years. This **third-level** academic degree, **Doctorate of Research**, is awarded to candidates who have successfully documented their research and written an original final thesis. This programme is open to a limited number of candidates (also from foreign countries), who must be university graduates or hold equivalent degrees.

### **Post-graduate Diplomas of Specialization**

These diplomas are given by schools offering special advanced courses in various professions. The limited places are reserved for university graduates or those with equivalent foreign qualifications. The courses last 2/3 years and include practical experience. Attendance is mandatory. The final examination is a defence of a written thesis.

## 3. Luiss Guido Carli

### 3.1 Name and Governance

### 3.2 Type

Luiss Guido Carli is an independent university. It was established according to Article 1 of Italy's Higher Education Act, which gives independent universities full legal status while guaranteeing their autonomy in the areas of administration, teaching and discipline. Its degrees and diplomas have complete legal and academic recognition.

### 3.3 General Description

Luiss Guido Carli was set up in 1974-78 by a consortium of private and public companies, that re-organized a pre-existing Institution, "Pro Deo". Its goal is to form students to assume the responsibilities of managing complex economic systems in both the State and private sectors.

At present Luiss Guido Carli has two Schools, Undergraduate and Graduate, and the following features:

- admission by entrance test
- full time compulsory attendance of courses
- a highly qualified teaching staff
- intensive study of foreign languages and computer training
- a large specialised [library](#) and a catalogue that can be consulted directly from the University's web site
- An extensive network of [student exchange agreements](#) with 250 universities, both within and outside of Europe in 51 countries. Luiss also offers its students the opportunity to study abroad: 68 [Double Degrees and Structured Partnerships](#).

- orientation for high school students
- seminars and debates on important issues as a complement to lectures
- assistance by qualified tutors during the entire university study period as well as traineeships
- personal counselling service to facilitate integration and to optimise study strategies.

**Professors and lecturers** are appointed from the academic world, the professions, senior State and private sector management. **Lectures are held in Italian and English.** They are integrated by seminars, debates and conferences on both Italian and international topics, often with the participation of prominent guest speakers.

**The annual tuition fee** at Luiss Guido Carli, for the a. y. 2025/2026, is € 12,600 for all Bachelor's degrees and for the Single Cycle Master Degree in Law (1 year). The annual tuition fee for Master's Degrees is € 13,600 and € 15.300 for Management and Corporate Finance degree courses.

### 3.7 Registration procedures

#### 3.7.1 Prospective full time EU and non-EU students (Not applicable to Exchange students)

The number of students admitted to the first year is limited to allow best teaching conditions and admission goes upon an entrance examination (aptitude test).

### 3.7.2 Specific requirements for students applying for “corsi singoli” (individual courses) (Not applicable to Exchange students)

Foreign students may attend one or more Luiss Guido Carli courses and take the respective exams. At the end of the course, students will obtain a certificate stating the course that was taken and the mark obtained.

Students from outside the European Union must respect regulations stipulated by the Ministry of Education, Universities and Research (MUR).

Luiss welcomes requests from all students, including holders of **bachelor’s, master’s, or single-cycle degrees** who have a proven need to attend courses and pass exams in disciplines that are legally required to participate in public competitions or enroll in specialist graduate schools.

**Documents** required to register in single courses **must be submitted by the beginning of the semester** in which the courses commence.

Students who want to apply for single courses (Corsi Singoli) must submit the following documents:

- an application form addressed to the Rector, detailing the student’s study plan;
- a certificate attesting the educational qualification earned, including exam scores or grades received: foreign students must submit an official Transcript of Records from their home University issued in English; only if the issuing of an official document in English language is not available, the certificate must be translated and certified by the appropriate diplomatic and consular authorities;
- two photographs, one of which (NON-EU students only) must be authenticated by the appropriate Italian diplomatic and consular authorities, indicating citizenship, residence, and the date and place of birth;
- a €16.00 duty stamp to be affixed to the application;
- receipt of payment.

The fee for each individual course is € 1.600,00 for undergraduate and graduate programs.

## 4. Incoming Erasmus/Exchange Students

The Luiss Student Mobility Office promotes and manages student exchanges within the Erasmus Program, as well as through bilateral exchange agreements with non-European universities. It provides information and assistance to all students participating in these study abroad programs. All procedures are based on the ECTS system. A substantial part of this activity is devoted to the orientation and support of foreign students, to whom the following section is addressed. The **Student Mobility Office** deals with orientation and registration of students on exchange programmes (Erasmus + and Bilateral Agreements).

The first step to spend a semester at Luiss in exchange is to contact the International Coordinator at your Home University. Each **sending** Institution is responsible for the selection of students.

Ask them for all the information, documents, brochures, application forms related to Luiss. All information material can also be found on our [website](#). Read the instructions carefully before you apply. **Be aware of our deadlines.**

All exchange students must be nominated by their home university **between April 1 and May 8 for both Fall and/or Spring semester**. The home coordinator must fill out the [nomination form](#) and email it to [in\\_erasmusexchange@luiss.it](mailto:in_erasmusexchange@luiss.it).

All applications must be received by **between April 1 and May 15, that is the fixed deadline for fall and/or spring semester applications every year**.

As soon as the application forms are received and processed, in June, Luiss will send incoming students acceptance letters and practical information.

Since there are over [500 courses taught in English](#), students will not need to have any knowledge of Italian to study at Luiss.

Luiss student exchange agreements are based on mutual trust in selecting students and language proficiency certified by each home institution. Students selected for an exchange should be proficient in the language of instruction at the host university.

With **most** of our partners we have agreed that language proficiency will be certified by each home university, confirming that the level is adequate. **Students will not be required to submit the results of an official language test for the exchange program.**

**From our partner universities with whom we have not agreed on a language certificate waiver, we will require proof of language proficiency** for English and/or Italian to study at Luiss.

**NB** Each semester, a minimum of two exam opportunities will be available for each course. However, for 2<sup>nd</sup> year graduate courses (excluding Law courses, to which the undergraduate course policy applies), students may select only one exam date from the options offered.

## 4.2 Courses, Exams, Transcripts of Records

### The Luiss Education Model

Luiss University aims to be a focal point for nurturing a new generation of leaders of change and citizens of the future, offering a learning environment that combines academic excellence, innovation and an international outlook.

Luiss University provides an education that is aligned with developments in the labour market and society, enhancing the synergy between theory and practice. Students can thus develop independent critical thinking and learn the necessary tools to face global challenges with a broad and informed vision.

### One educational vision, two tailor-made paths

The University has an education model, differentiated in its application for the Undergraduate School and the Graduate School. Advanced skills in the social sciences are integrated with a deep understanding of emerging technologies, thus responding to the needs of an increasingly complex and interconnected world.

The core of the Luiss Education Model is one and the same, but its application is tailored to adapt and respond in a targeted manner to the educational needs of each stage of a student's university studies.

the Luiss Education Model takes shape in the Undergraduate School, aimed at students pursuing a bachelor's degree or a single-cycle master's degree in law, and in the Graduate School, aimed at students pursuing a master's degree.

**Undergraduate School Educational Model – Engaged Learning**, an experiential and interactive education split into six phases:

1. **Acquisition** - The professor imparts knowledge that restructures the student's conceptual framework.
2. **Investigation** - The student independently investigates the topics covered.
3. **Discussion** - Discussion with peers and faculty stimulates critical thinking.
4. **Collaboration** - Teamwork generates shared results and cooperative learning.
5. **Practice** - Knowledge is applied to real contexts.
6. **Production** - The student develops original ideas and produces content.

The aim is to provide not only theoretical knowledge, but a transferable and lasting learning method, capable of adapting to new and changing issues.

For those enrolling in Bachelor's Degree programmes from the 2025-2026 academic year, a **compulsory midterm exam** will be introduced. **Students can decline the midterm grade and choose to take the entire test in the exam session, but it will no longer be possible to decline a grade obtained in a final exam.**

Bachelor students will have 2 examination dates at the end of each semester in which the course is taught, 1 date in each subsequent session and 1 date in the autumn session.  
Single-Cycle students will have 3 examination dates at the end of each semester in which the course is taught, 3 date in each subsequent session and 1 date in the autumn session.

**Graduate School Educational Model – SMART:** an education approach to tackle the challenges of the future is split into five distinctive factors, which define its pedagogical framework and educational efficacy.

1. **Student-Centricity** - Customisable education programmes built around the specific needs of the student.
2. **Multidisciplinarity** - Integration of expertise from different areas of knowledge.
3. **Academic Rigor** - Solid theoretical preparation with advanced teaching methods.
4. **Readiness** - Focus on the practical application of skills in the world of work.
5. **Tech-Enhancement** - Targeted use of digital technologies to enhance learning.

Graduate School students must **actively participate in at least 70% of the lectures**. A lecture attendance tracking system is in place. Those who do not reach this threshold are considered non-compliant.

The student evaluation system adopted by the Graduate School consists of **continuous assessment**, designed to monitor progressive learning during the semester, where assessments count for **1/3 of the final grade**, and a **final exam** which **counts for 2/3 of the final grade**. Continuous assessment is mandatory and ongoing evaluations cannot be refused.

For those enrolling in Master's Degree programmes in their first year in the 2025/2026 academic year, **it will not be possible to decline continuous assessment or exam results.**

Master students will have 2 examination dates at the end of each semester in which the course is taught, 1 date in each subsequent session (during this exam session continuous assessment is not an option and consequently students are assessed in a single final exam, which counts for 100% of the grade obtained).

**Course selection** follows a **first-come, first-served policy** and takes place in **late June/July** for the **First Semester** and in **November/December** for the **Second Semester**, with an additional selection period during the **first week of classes**. The recommended workload is **24-30 ECTS credits**, although students may register for up to a **maximum of 40 ECTS credits**. Incoming students are advised not to take more than 24 credits if they do not stay for the full examination period and leave in December. Three or four courses per semester are the average workload for full-time study, depending on the year of study and level.

**Exchange students are given access to all the courses at Undergraduate and/or Graduate, as long as they have the necessary prerequisites and do not have time-table clashes**. The Graduate courses are at advanced level and students should have the required background and very good language competences.

Elective courses will be offered only if enough students register for the courses. Because not all courses will be offered, it is recommended that you enrol in more than one.

Exams are held after the teaching period and can be oral, written or both. Depending on the School and level, some courses will have two or three examination dates and students can choose the one they prefer.

The exact examination dates for each subject will be defined about a month and a half before the beginning of the examination session.

Guest students will have to enrol for each exam following the instructions provided upon arrival at Luiss.

**Exams can be taken only in person and on the official dates.**

Please note that **NO special examination can be arranged for exchange students**.

Transcripts of records will be sent by email to the Partner Institutions **4 weeks after the end the examinations periods** of each examination session. Luiss University is now embracing an eco-friendly policy and hardcopies will be sent only to those partners who explicitly request it. To the students who come to Luiss for the whole academic year or for the second semester, the transcripts will be sent by the end of July. Transcripts cannot be prepared before the session is over.

### **4.3 Grading System**

Individual courses are graded on a scale of **18-30/30**.

Very brilliant students may be awarded **30 cum laude (30 e lode)**. The minimum passing grade is **18/30**. Grades **below 18** are considered failing and are not registered.

Grades below 18 will not and cannot appear on the transcript of records. In Italy grades below 18 do not exist. **Exceptions cannot be made.**

Luiss students stand out for their academic excellence, as admission to the University is merit-based, competitive and highly selective.

#### **4.4 Courses in Italian language and culture**

Luiss Guido Carli offers **Italian language courses** to Erasmus and exchange students in both first and second semester. They are free of charge.

The courses have a schedule of three hours per week. The students who attend the courses and comply with the requirements will receive a certificate and gain **3 ECTS credits**.

**Students who would like to attend the semester courses can register only after arrival.**

The course is divided in five levels: **Beginners (A0-A1)**, **Beginners-Pre-Intermediate (A1-A2)**, **Intermediate (A2-B1)**, **Upper Intermediate-Advanced (B1-B2)** and **Advanced (C1)**.

Beginners Level (A0-A1)

**This level is for those who have never attended an Italian language course. The main aim of the course is to help the student understand sentences and frequently used expressions related to the**

**most immediately relevant areas (e.g. very basic personal and family information, shopping).**

#### **Beginners - Pre-Intermediate Level (A1-A2)**

This level is for those who have attended an Italian language course for a short period of time. The main aim of the course is to help the student understand sentences and frequently used expressions related to the most immediately relevant areas (e.g. shopping, local geography, transport, travel, holidays and hotels, employment).

#### **Intermediate Level (A2-B1)**

This level is for those who have already attended an Italian course and who are able to communicate in daily situations. The principal aim of the course is to improve oral communication. Particular emphasis is placed on comprehension, to enable students to take advantage of lectures in their university classes.

#### **Upper Intermediate - Advanced Level (B1-B2)**

This level is for those who are already proficient in the language and who need to develop specialized language skills. The main goal is to help the student reach a high standard of reading and writing.

#### **Advanced Level (C1)**

Extra activities are provided for Level C1. This level is for those who need to develop a topic systematically, giving appropriate emphasis to significant points, and presenting relevant supporting detail. Specific homework assignments or activities are a prerequisite for taking the test.

#### **Extracurricular activities**

These include:

- Presentations followed by discussion
- Meetings with Italian businessmen
- Guided tours with specialized teachers.

The activities and meetings develop topics already discussed in class and consider the interests of individual participants.

## 4.5 Accommodation

The Luiss University Accommodation Office assists international students in their search for accommodation during their stay in Rome as part of **Erasmus, Bilateral Exchange and Double-Degree** projects in the 2025/2026 academic year.

Luiss University offers international students the possibility to spend their period of studies at one of our:

- **Luiss halls of residence** (run directly by the University)
- **Affiliated halls of residence** (run by a private institution on foot of an agreement with the University)
- **Private rooms and apartments** selected and offered by online property rental platforms and local real estate agencies on foot of agreements with the University.

To be able to apply for accommodation at one of the halls of residence, students are required to apply through an automated online booking system. The system will process applications in chronological order contingent upon the availability of the desired accommodation.

## 4.6 Health and insurance

Students from the EU are entitled to the services of the Italian National Health Service using their European Health Insurance Card (E.H.I.C.). However, the card does not cover rescue, repatriation and private health care. We suggest to verify how to get the card and which services are covered with the social security administration of your country before your departure, as each country's healthcare system is different, services that cost nothing at home might not be free in another country. Non-EU students are required to subscribe a health insurance covering all risks that students might incur in during the whole exchange period abroad.

Non-EU students must hold a health insurance policy meeting the following requirements:

- It must cover expenses in the event of emergency treatments, urgent hospitalization, accidents, and injuries.
- It must cover the entire duration of your stay in Italy
- It must be valid for the territory of all member-states applying to the Schengen Agreement in its entirety.
- It must guarantee the policy-holder's return to his/her own country in case of serious illness.
- If it is in a language other than Italian or English, it must be translated into at least English.

It is essential that students promptly purchase health insurance, as it is required for their residence permit and often for visa purposes.

### Healthcare Facilities

Students and Luiss Graduates can take advantage of **free** medical services provided on campus by our staff physician – **Dr. Gianpiero Cutolo**, Via Parenzo II (Room T04):

- **Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays:** from 3 pm to 4 pm.
- **Tuesdays and Thursdays:** from 10 am to 12 am.

In August, the on-campus care service is closed.

Luiss also offers a **free** preventive medicine service through qualified local health units off-campus. To reduce risks and encourage a healthy campus, students can take routine health care exams, which can be integrated by more specific ones, if required.

The new Luiss Wellbeing Hub is available at the Borghetto in Viale Romania campus.

The Hub, coordinated by Professor Maurizio Evangelista, offers to students, teachers, and staff general consultation services as well as national-level specialists in the areas with the greatest bio-psychosocial impact, with particular attention paid to the awareness and prevention of the main chronic conditions, including Long COVID syndrome.

## 4.7 Administrative formalities

### 4.7.1 Visa and Residency for Non-EU Students

Italian bureaucracy can sometimes be challenging. For this reason, the Student Mobility is committed to providing the best possible support to incoming exchange students. You can find constantly updated information about Visa and Residency request for Non-EU Students on our [webpage](#).

### 4.7.2 Registration for EU Students

For EU students who plan to stay in Italy for less than three months, no formality is requested.

For stays longer than three months, students need to submit the **temporary registration** (*Dichiarazione di Residenza*) at the Registry Office of the municipality where they live.

In order to determine which Roman municipality they belong to, students will have to call +39 060606 telling the address of their accommodation in Rome, or they can visit this [official website](#), enter their home address, and click on the map. The designated municipality will be displayed.

To apply for temporary registration, you must submit a **request form** (*Dichiarazione di Residenza*) to the **Registry Office of the municipality responsible for your area**. You can do this:

1. **In person**, or
2. **Remotely**, via certified email, ordinary email, or registered mail, attaching a **photocopy of your ID**.

Additionally, the following documents are required:

- **Personal ID** (or Passport)
- **Acceptance letter from Luiss**
- **Proof of sufficient financial resources** to cover the full course of study (a self-declaration is also acceptable).
- **Comprehensive private health insurance policy** or **European Health Insurance Card (EHIC)**

## 5. The Undergraduate School

The Undergraduate School at Luiss Guido Carli incorporates undergraduate degree programs and the single cycle degree program in Law.

### 5.1 Undergraduate Degree Courses

By clicking on the name of the Programs the course structure is available.

#### **Economics and Management (Economia e Management – held in Italian) - (180 ECTS credits)**

The bachelor's degree in Economics and Management is a three-year program. The language of instruction is Italian.

The degree is designed to develop the analytical, decision-making and leadership skills that are essential for the **effective interpretation and management of contemporary economic and business phenomena**. Through the integration of economic, business and legal knowledge, this programme adopts an innovative didactic approach based on the use of active methods and case studies, promoting dynamic and engaging learning to understand economic and management theory, but also to apply this knowledge in practical and innovative ways, addressing real and current problems in the world of work. The course emphasises critical thinking and **strategic decision-making skills**, essential qualities for future leaders in a global context.

#### **Business Administration (held in English) - (180 ECTS credits)**

The bachelor's degree in Business Administration is a course of excellence designed to meet the challenges of the global marketplace. Thanks to an interdisciplinary approach, this programme combines theoretical teaching with practical experience, enabling students to gain an in-depth understanding of business dynamics and international markets. The course uses innovative teaching methods including case study analysis, interactive workshops and group projects. This **hands-on approach to business administration** is designed to stimulate the critical thinking and problem-solving skills that are fundamental to managing the complexities of contemporary business. In an increasingly interconnected world, the **Business Administration course** prepares students to become change enablers and provides them with the necessary tools to operate successfully in international and multicultural contexts in **leadership roles**.

Up to 15 students enrolled in the first year of the Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration (BBA) can take part in ACE – Triple Degree in Business.

### **Management and Artificial Intelligence (held in English) - (180 ECTS credits)**

The bachelor's degree program in **Management and Artificial Intelligence** meets the growing need for experts in AI, big data management and digitalisation, equipped with combines managerial and quantitative skills with in-depth knowledge of cutting-edge digital technologies. Through an interdisciplinary curriculum that integrates STEM disciplines, business and management sciences, the programme is designed to develop innovative leaders capable of successfully navigating an ever-changing technological landscape. The learning environment emphasises the practical use of digital technologies, from machine learning to artificial intelligence, to develop innovative solutions to modern business problems. The course focuses on the use of information technology to optimise business operations, improve strategic decision-making and enhance the overall performance of organisations.

### **Economics and Business (held in English) - (180 ECTS credits)**

The three-year bachelor's degree program in **Economics and Business** is designed to provide in-depth knowledge in the key areas of economics, management and finance from an international perspective. It is designed for those who wish to understand and manage the complexities of the **global economic and financial landscape**, providing the tools to address and positively influence global and contemporary challenges. Through a multidisciplinary approach, the program combines the study of **economic theory with innovative business practices**, preparing students to make informed and strategic decisions in an international context. Students will also have the opportunity to engage with real-world case studies, take part in market simulations and develop projects aimed at solving real-world problems. As a result, students will gain a deep understanding of economic dynamics and practical skills essential for **leadership roles**.

The three areas of specialization in the third year are **Management, Economics, and Finance** (held entirely in English) and give students the option of focusing on their possible future master's programs.

Up to 10 1<sup>st</sup>-year Economics and Business students can take part in **EUTribe. The European Triple Bachelor's Degree in Economics and Business** is an exciting collaboration between Goethe University in Frankfurt, Luiss University in Rome, and Solvay School of Economics & Management in Brussels that grants selected students the opportunity to study at a different university and a different location each year. Upon successful completion of the programme, students receive a Bachelor's degree from the three participating universities.

### **Global Law (held in English) - (180 ECTS credits)**

The bachelor's degree program in **Global Law** offers a legal education enriched by a strong cosmopolitan dimension, combining the study of law with an in-depth exploration of the economics and management of technological innovation, thus providing a comprehensive preparation. The programme provides the skills necessary to successfully navigate the complexities of transnational regulation and prepares students to deal with legal issues in a variety of sectors and cultural contexts. This single Course goes beyond traditional areas of law to provide an in-depth analysis of the interaction between **law, technology and the global economy**. Students will learn how law regulates innovation, study **international regulatory frameworks** and explore the legal implications of emerging technologies such as artificial intelligence and blockchain. The course also encourages students to develop a critical and analytical outlook, which is essential for analysing and solving legal problems in complex and changing scenarios. The focus on global governance and human rights also emphasises the importance of ethically informed and socially responsible legal practice.

In the third year students will be asked to choose a specialization area: **Global Law, Business and Tech, Global Law and International Organizations** or **Italian Law**.

#### **Political Science (Scienze Politiche - held in Italian) - (180 ECTS credits)**

The bachelor's degree program in **Political Science** offers an interdisciplinary approach to the study of global political dynamics, combining advanced quantitative and qualitative methods to analyse and solve complex problems in the contemporary political environment. It is a programme designed to develop informed and responsible leaders capable of interpreting and influencing political processes at local, national and international levels. The programme explores topics such as **political theory, comparative politics, international relations and public policy**, providing an in-depth understanding of the power structures, ideologies and **policies that shape global scenarios**. The course also places a strong emphasis on critical analysis and strategic thinking, promoting a broad understanding of fundamental political and social issues. provides an interdisciplinary preparation in the national and international legal, economic, political, social and historical matters, a methodology for research, an understanding of social, economic and political processes.

#### **Politics: Philosophy and Economics (held in English) - (180 ECTS credits)**

The bachelor's degree program in **Politics: Philosophy and Economics** is characterised by a strong interdisciplinary vocation, combining philosophy, political science, economics, sociology, history and law for the understanding of global dynamics. The Politics, Philosophy and Economics programme includes **specialisations in Artificial Intelligence, Sustainability** and the **Protection of Fundamental Rights**, which are essential for effectively analysing and responding to contemporary issues from multiple perspectives and methodological approaches. The PPE programme develops not only specific knowledge, but also critical skills such as analytical thinking, argumentation and ethical sensitivity, all essential qualities for leaders who wish to positively influence change in contemporary society. Considerable focus is given to languages. The Politics, Philosophy and Economics major is open only to students with advanced proficiency in English, who continue to work on Academic English as well as one or two other foreign languages.

## 5.2 Single-Cycle Degree Program in Law (300 ECTS credits)

The Single-Cycle Degree Program In Law provides a sound and comprehensive legal education to train competent and innovative lawyers, ready to meet the challenges of today's legal sector. The curriculum is designed to cover all the main areas of law, **including civil, criminal, administrative, commercial, international and labour law**, to ensure in-depth and versatile knowledge. A distinctive element of the course is practical activities such as mock trials, negotiations and legal clinics. These immersive experiences allow theoretical knowledge to be applied in real-life scenarios, developing practical skills essential for arguing, negotiating and **solving complex legal problems**. These activities are supported by teaching that makes extensive use of case studies and simulation.

The programme of the Degree Course in Law is a 5-year study plan; the first three and a half years of which are devoted to the study of the basic subjects necessary for the preparation of any lawyer, and the last one and a half years to the specialisation in one of the nine fields of expertise, with a variety of practical and experiential courses, in order to provide the theoretical and practical skills necessary for immediate entry into the world of work.

- Civil Law
- Law and Economics of Business
- Company and Tax Law
- Criminal Law
- Administrative Law
- International Law
- Labour and Social Security Law
- **European Law (in English)**
- **Law and Innovation (Bilingual)**

The final degree will be obtained at the end of the five-year study cycle, and the Laurea will have the same value of a Laurea Magistralis.

**Graduate-level courses** are advanced in nature; students enrolling in these courses should have a **strong academic background** and **proficient language skills**.

Optional courses will be offered only if enough students register for the courses.

**Law courses** are taught at the **Via Parenzo** and **Viale Pola** campuses.

All other courses are held at the **Viale Romania** campus.

Rome has an integrated public transport network operated by the companies ATAC – Cotral – FS-Ferrovie dello Stato. The system includes a network of metro, bus, tram and metro-type rail service.

Bus and tram services (ATAC) cover the center of the city and the suburbs. They operate from 5:30 am to 12:00 Pm. Night bus service is available from midnight to 5:30 am. Night busses are recognized by the number followed by the letter N (notturno).

There are three metro lines, A, B and C which connect extraurban and peripheral zones with the center.

- Metro line A runs from Battistini Station, situated northwest of the city, to Anagnina Station in the south-east. Trains circulate from 5:30 am to 11:30 pm (until 1:30 am on Fridays and Saturdays).
- Metro line B runs from Rebibbia station, situated north-east of the city, to Laurentina Station to the center-south.
- Metro line C runs from San Giovanni station to Pantano Station.

Trains circulate from 5:30 am to 11:30 pm (until 1:30 am on Fridays and Saturdays).

The only station where you can transfer from line A to line B is Termini Station.

A shuttle train called the Leonardo Express, leaving every 30 minutes (from 6:37 am to 11:37 pm) links Fiumicino International Airport with Termini Central Station. The price of the ticket is €14 for one ride.

You can also ask at any tourist information stand for a free map of the transportation network.

Single tickets (€1.50) allow you to use all means of public transportation within the metropolitan area of Rome for up to 100 minutes.

Monthly passes cost €35 and last for the calendar month, so we recommend buying them at the beginning of the month.
